

#### What we all know:

The aging of the population:

- •12% of the population is 65 or older today.
- •16% will be 65 or older in 2020
- •19% will be 65 or older in 2030


The declining number of working-age adults per older person:

- •5 working-age adults per older person today
- •4 working-age adults per older person in 2020
- •3 working-age adults per older person in 2030




Trends in Divorce





















### The Increase in births to cohabiting couples


## Roughly:

- 40% of all births occur outside of marriage.
- •Half of all unmarried women are cohabiting at the time of birth.
- •20% of all births are to cohabiting couples
